~ Chairman Report ~

It seems like we just celebrated Thanksgiving, and now Christmas is coming up quickly. It is good to reflect on physical blessings and provision in November, but in a way the remembrance in December is even more powerful, as we remember our source of eternal blessing.

In His mercy, God has given us another year in His service at home, church, work, and school. He has given us the freedom and ability to continue educating our children as we deem best, which is according to His revelation in creation and Word. May God give us courage as we continue to do this, even as the culture around us moves farther away from God's revelation. We are undoubtedly in the midst of a cultural shift, and our children may face more pressing moral challenges than their parents. We pray that God will bless the work done at CCS to prepare them well for this.

Hopefully many of you could meet Nathan Kok and his wife Luanne when they were here. It was a good visit for the board, as we were able to share detailed information with the Koks about where things stand in the immigration process. The uncertainty of the timing makes this a difficult situation for their family, but I think it was an encouragement to them to be here in person, as it was for us. The next major hurdle in the process is to get Nathan's approval to work from the US Department of Labor. That application has been made, and it is the first step in the process to gain permanent residency status. In the meantime, we discussed and we are pursuing other methods that could possibly get the Koks here more quickly, without jeopardizing the ability to get permanent residency.

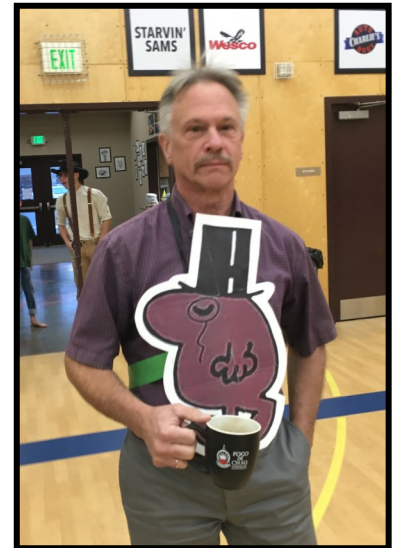
The board is working with the results of the building expansion survey. Thank you for your participation! We documented key conclusions, which will be passed along to you for your information by email. The survey had unanimous agreement on the need and desire to expand. Also, it's pretty easy to see a number of trends of thinking among us that will help guide our next steps. We are doing our best to keep this topic moving quickly.

High school basketball season has begun again under the oversight of the Athletic Committee, one of the committees established by the board. Here is an excerpt from the mandate of this committee:

The athletic committee is composed of the CCS athletic director (which may or may not be the principal), one teaching staff member, one board member, and one school society member (if possible, this member is a league coach).

The purpose of the athletic committee is to provide for the good operation of the athletic leagues that are organized and managed by CCS staff and whose financial accounting is under the oversight of the CCS board. This includes ensuring that the leagues are operated within the guidelines established by the board, and that the existence of the leagues continues to serve the official objectives of the society.

As mentioned in the mandate, we have an Athletic Director on staff, Gavin Willis, who is responsible for

~ Principal Report ~

Is it too much of a cliché to say that time has flown by? Truly, the weeks since our last Link have evaporated quickly. We can also say we are nearing the end of the first half of the school year. But before we rush off to celebrate, let's take a moment to look back at the past two months.

School life

First, the high school finished up its first quarter with the elementary following two weeks later. A lot of thought and effort goes into producing these reports. Then came the interview nights.

It is greatly appreciated that you made the time and effort to come. Interviews are important. I came across one Christian school's website that described parent-teacher conferences as the eyes that allow teachers and parents to share the struggles and celebrations that they see. Interviews are the ears when we listen to each other to get a better understanding of what the teacher or parent sees and perceives at home. The interview is like a hand of partnership for after all, the school's mandate is to assist the parents. The interview is compared to feet, in that it helps to carry out the plan for the student's learning going forward. And finally, but certainly not least importantly, the interview is the heart. Both parties at the meeting have a heart full of love for the student. Both parties want what is best for the student academically and beyond. In addition, the student at home also receives an unspoken message that the communication between school and home is important, that what happens at school is important; important enough to take time out of a busy day to chat with the teacher for 6 or 8 minutes about what happens in the classroom. The attendance at Cornerstone interviews is high and it is encouraging! Thank you.

What about the fun things? In this case, the extra-curricular activities that build school spirit are meant. In most recent memory is Reading month which we enjoyed during November. Mrs. Kooiker and Miss Kingma took on the challenge of organizing this and did a fine job raising the joy of reading to our attention. A big highlight was the photo contest for the best reading spot. Apparently reading on the roof top, on a goat or amongst the cows are

the favorite places. Other options could be riding a moose, flying through the air or hanging upside down. Of course, another highlight was the book character pancake breakfast. These extra activities are fun for teachers, too, but so are PD days. I'd like to share a little summary of our latest PD days. In November after some in-house work, the teachers separated in their divisions of high school and elementary and went on an excursion. High school staff had the opportunity to visit Credo High and elementary staff went to John Calvin in Yarrow. In both cases staff could visit classrooms and interact with colleagues after school. For us, at Cornerstone the opportunity to connect with colleagues outside of our school had been greatly hampered in the last few years. We are thankful to these schools for opening up their doors to us. This was of great encouragement to us!

Another opportunity came up with the RCDC (Reformed Curriculum Development Committee) conference. The focus this year was "Indigenous Perspectives in Reformed Schools". In BC, there is a government mandate to teach a course on Indigenous Peoples, but the conference was attended by teachers across Canada, as well as myself and Mr. Chase. To engage in purposeful thinking on this topic, whether the government requires it, or not, was beneficial. America has a different history in regards to the Indigenous Peoples, but to consider how we, as Reformed Christians, should deal with our history is important.

It is good to take a moment in this Link to take a look at another Educational Goal. Goal Seven in the parent handbook states that the school will “Ensure parental involvement”.
