What a whirlwind finish to the school year! Without the Inspire group moving into the school for the summer, I thought that perhaps the call for packing boxes wouldn't be there. I couldn't have been more wrong. There was barely a space that remained untouched this year. If a room isn't being recarpeted over the summer, then it is storing the materials of the rooms that are. As a result of the expansion project several classrooms are moving to a different space as well. The school definitely looks like it is ready for summer break at the moment. Of course, we know the pain now is bringing us great gain at the end of summer. The excitement here is mounting!

The staff is also eager to put regular tasks aside to refresh and recharge over the upcoming weeks, and it is well deserved. Everyone has been putting in just a wee bit extra these last few weeks. As we rounded out the month of May, Sports Day could take place. With the good weather forecast, we pressed on with all our plans for this fun-filled day. It seems that every year we get eager passers -by wondering how they can get their children involved in such a fun event. While we couldn't sign up their children, we certainly could acknowledge it is a great event to be a part of. With some of the changes that we made this year I think it was better than ever. At our year end staff review meeting we note some improvements we want to make for next year. If you have some suggestions, we happily receive those, too, in an email, and will add them to our file for next year.

Other end of year activities included Aimsweb testing, one final Senior project night, course selections for next year, and year end trip planning. Finalizing staff input on expansion/renovation plans also took some thought, but to say we are eager as a staff to be working in the school building next year with all its renovations and new space would be an understatement. Please be aware that in August we will be implementing some changes in how we do things, so be watching out for those information notices.

#### **STAFFING**

As everyone is aware the needs for staffing were a cause for concern. With a lot of holes to fill it was hard sometimes to see our way forward with a plan. I'm happy to report that with the recent hiring of Tricia, the board has also approved a plan for a 3/4 teaching team. Having a full time teacher in place for 1/2 allowed other willing trained community members to step forward for the 3/4 position, knowing that the other need had been looked after. So 3/4 will indeed be a team effort. Ranelle Faber will be leading the class three mornings, Bea Sterk will be taking the class one whole day and an afternoon, and Stephanie Bareman will cover Friday mornings. The three afternoons that will not be taught by Bea Sterk will be covered by part-time subject specific instructors. Karen Martin will teach PE, Melanie Kottelenberg will continue to teach Music, and Jolene Groves has also offered to come in and teach Science one afternoon a week.

In addition, our para-education department is still seeking one more person to be a part of that team. If you like working with students in a variety of subjects, though math and language do get the largest portion of our focus, we would love to hear from you. It's not a hard job, but it is definitely a rewarding one!

I'm also thrilled to report that our Spanish instruction will continue to be led by a trained Spanish instructor. Our maternity leave fill-in of this past spring, has agreed to come back as our regular instructor. Naomi Bormuth is only able to commit to 3 days a week, so the 4th day of weekly Spanish instruction will be a supervised period for Spanish lesson work. We are glad to have found a capable, enthusiastic instructor and a way to make this work for the coming year.

#### **FAREWELL**

Good-byes are hard. This year we have to say our good-byes to a few staff members. Mrs. Kruyswijk has been at Cornerstone for many years, faithfully working with our youngest students. Her gentle and kind demeanor was a blessing to the students, and we are thankful for the time and love she was able to share with the Cornerstone community over these years she was working on the CCS team. Now she is stepping away from her teaching tasks at this time, and while we will miss her, we wish her the Lord's blessings over her future plans. Also leaving are Mrs. Gonzalez, (But wait, she promised to sub in Spanish if we needed her sometimes - so it's likely we will see her from time to time) Mrs. Groves (but wait, she's coming back

for one afternoon next year, so it's not a full farewell for her), Mrs. Thompson (but wait, she's teaching one day of kindergarten next year, so we will still see her in the building), Mrs. K. Hofford (But wait, is this a temporary hiatus? - she sure loves Math!) Mrs. Kleyn (But wait, she's not really leaving. She's done helping out as a team member in 3/4 but she will be back to do subbing, for sure!) Mrs. Klos (But wait, . . wait. . . she also was helping out as a 3/4 teaching team member, but she truly might not be back in the classroom next year. Thank you for all you have done to help.) It is quickly recognized that being a part of the Cornerstone community can look different from time to time, but it really is a community effort. It truly is a blessing to be working with so many of you, who have a real love and commitment to Cornerstone, and make sacrifices to be here and help with the education of all our students.

It's now June and a time to relax a little, refresh a lot, and recharge to full battery power again. This summer a lot of visible preparation will be evident from the work on the building project, but also behind the scenes, perhaps on home computers, the teachers will be putting plans to paper to prepare for a new beginning in the fall. 
