

Flourish in Christ! Those were the words we kept in mind all year. What does that look like? Could it be completed curriculums? First grade students have learned to read, count and add. Fourth grade students have learned about multiplication and long division, but also spent some time working through some great novels. Eighth graders completed their learning goals successfully so that now they are our new high school students! Then in high school our students learned how to dissect various creatures and label them correctly. They learned how to set out proofs and the meaning of SOHCAHTOA. Our twelfth grade students completed their curriculum to the point of graduation! Are these signs the students have been flourishing?

Could it be the relationships students have with others at school? Is it the friendships forged in the young grades, or those solidified in middle school? Students working together on group projects or the camaraderie developed on sports teams are also a big part of school life. Students on the playground go out of their way to help a school mate. Is that a sign of flourishing?

Could it be the community spirit we see at the school? There are volunteers at the school every day, and almost every hour of every day. The hall-way is often abuzz with the chatter of adults connecting, and not just with each other, but with students, too. Even at night the sense of community remains strong, with sport practices and games, or at a meeting from any one of the various committees. Is this what flourishing looks like?

Could it be the teachers' enthusiasm for sharing knowledge and helping skills develop. The 'Aha" moment when a difficult concept was now understood by a student is a teacher's joy! Taking stock of a child's growth over the course of a quarter is encouraging for an educator. Might this be what flourishing looks like?

Scripture teaches us a lot about flourishing. The section above, I would suggest, is all part of it. When students are working on what they are called to do, when they are relating to one another

in a manner that builds one another up, when we work together as a community to achieve the mission of our school, or when teachers work with each child so that they can reach their potential, all of this is part of flourishing. With one crucial caveat! The foundation or source of the strength necessary for this work must be our Lord. True flourishing only happens when we put the Lord first and obey his will.
