This line of thought led me once again to that part of the CCS vision document that I've mentioned before: "the pursuit of knowledge and the development of talents, with a view to being faithful stewards over creation, is a necessary and worthy endeavor." In particular, the phrase stewards over creation. We believe that God owns all things and we are in fact stewards. As stewards, we are not the ultimate owners of anything, but are entrusted with managing what God owns. One could say that what we commonly call "ownership" is really stewardship. So, we can encourage our children to progressively "take ownership" of their academic performance as they mature. But we understand that they have been entrusted by God with abilities and they have an obligation to steward those abilities, as they also learn to steward material things. What wonderful grace that God has shown to us, and such a meaningful way to understand education and vocation!

"How dumb is this writer?", you may be wondering, "Doesn't he know that there is a double EE not a double FF in 'free'?" You may also be thinking it's advisable he audit a few sessions with the first and second grades to get a refresher on proper capitalization.

Well, it was intentional. Since it's an acronym all basic standards of spelling and punctuation are off the table. As a reminder FFRE (Foundation for Reformed Education) is the Canada-based foundation that is directed by the Cornerstone Foundation. It allows family and friends that live north of the border to make charitable donations to Cornerstone Christian School.

Quote: "The Foundation For Reformed Education is a non-profit organization formed to provide direct support to Cornerstone Christian School." End quote.

If that piqued your interest and you just have to read on, well there is more where that came from. If you are reading this edition of the LINK via pdf received in your email, check that message for an additional pdf attachment, an informational brochure about FFRE and its connection to Cornerstone Christian School. THINGS TO NOTE:

Before I close out this article, I'd like to bring a few matters to your attention.

• I mentioned the article about AI that staff members read and discussed. One thing we gleaned was that this can be a very powerful and useful tool. We want this to be used properly and to the betterment of student learning. Students need to be aware that legally it isn't to be used independently under the age of 18. Teachers will therefore also keep that in mind in preparing assignments. Assignments will be designed to encourage critical thinking skills in the students and limit the possibility of AI use in place of the student's own thinking.

 We would also like to remind everyone about the cell phone rule. Please remember that your child should NOT be accessing their phone during the school day. If you need to forward a message, please feel free to email the teacher and it will be passed along, or expect your

child(ren) to receive the message at the end of the day. Phones should be kept in the lockers or their cars during the course of the day.

• Please remember the pick up protocol. When at the front of the school, please pull as far forward as you can as the first car, even following the curve somewhat. It would also be a huge help on Fridays if the friend-visitingarrangements were made ahead of time, instead of while the car is in the pick up line. We appreciate your help with this. We want to avoid having cars lined up on Northwood Road.

• For school safety it should be noted that the high school foyer doors will be locked after 8:15. All students arriving after that time will have to enter by the front door. Students coming in after 10:30 (when Mrs. VanDiest has gone home) will be asked to sign in using the form on the counter.

•Fiinally, a reminder regarding absences. For a single day absence, please remember to send an email to <u>absent@cornerstoneschool.us</u>. It is not okay to simply let one classroom teacher know. There are a variety of teachers that teach each class and it is important for the school to know who is present and who is not. For long absences, like a family vacation, we would appreciate a note at least a week in advance. Teachers may chose to share some



homework in advance, but are not required to do so. Onus on catching up remains with first of all with the student.

• We also respectfully request that if you need to convey a message to a student during class time, that you do so with as little disruption to the instruction as possible. Please wave at the door to get the teacher's attention or leave a sticky note on the door. We want to reduce interruptions/distractions to instructional time as much as possible.

So heading into the new school year, we thank you all for your part in getting things ready for the new school year. And as always, we covet your prayers for a successful year. We do this not on our own strength, but rely on our Heavenly Father to guide and sustain us.

<u>Severe NUT Allergy</u>

A child in 1st grade has a life-threatening allergy to most nuts, with *walnuts and peanuts* very high on the list.
