Welcome to the LINK for February 2024! We are into our third quarter of the school year, which means it is already time to start planning for next year. The Board has begun the process of reviewing intentions for the 25-26 school year with the teachers. With a couple exceptions for those whose circumstances have changed, our teachers would like to continue next year! This is always nice to hear, as it is an indication that CCS is a desirable place to work. As next year's teaching schedule becomes more firm, specific teaching duties will be assigned, which will then be reflected in the teacher contracts.

As promised, I would like to continue the review of the Strategic Plan, which is in its 6th year of implementation. In the last LINK, I went over Goal 1 (Governance and Administration). This time, we'll take a look at goal 2: Infrastructure and Campus Resources - Maintaining a functional campus and learning environment where our mission happens. The strategic plan projects that this is how things will look when this goal has been met:

- 1. A Building Report assists in planning for future space needs in the school building.*
- 2. A Depreciation Report assists in planning for the repair and replacement of major infrastructure and equipment.*
- 3. A Technology Inventory Report and tracking system assists in monitoring the lifespan of all technology equipment.*
- 4. A Maintenance Procedure Manual assists in keeping track of regular maintenance needs.*
- 5. A Land Utilization Report assists*

in choosing the best plan for the land parcel next door.

With the building expansion committee engaged as they are, it's not too hard to see that we are pursuing strategic goals with regard to our building infrastructure. But, as with goal 1, the Board will be reviewing these Goal 2 benchmarks at this 6-year mark, and we will decide what has been successfully accomplished and what remains to be done.

Another thing the board has been busy with is handling the evaluation and on-boarding of non-ARC parents sending their children to CCS. As in the past, the Board is able to enroll students whose parents are not members by exception only, so we are working through this process carefully. We hope to soon have a new policy that describes how we process these requests and keep track of them over time. It is gratifying to know that the education that CCS offers, which is firmly grounded in submission to the God of the Bible in all things, is attractive to others outside our church community. May God continue to bless our efforts.

Ed Comm Report: Wrestling with Technology in Education

You're hungry, and right there in front of you is a tree full of ripe fruit – would it be wrong to grab one? Well, if you're in ancient Israel, it'd be no big thing – just a bit of gleaning. But if you were in the Garden of Eden, and this was *that* tree, then it would be a big deal indeed. So fruit eating is not wrong or right in itself; the issue here is obedience or disobedience.

ChatGPT is a new reality that isn't wrong or right in itself either. It might strike parents as problematic, since kids are now able to turn to this tool and, with just a few prompts, churn out their homework. Need a 600-word essay on the biblical perspective on why abortion is wrong? ChatGPT can output it in less time than it'll take most students to type the request.

Isn't that cheating? Yes, if the teacher wanted students to write it on their own.

But it isn't hard to imagine how teachers could also incorporate AI tools into lessons on not only writing, but editing and analysis. How good is the AI essay? Where is it weak, and what might it be missing? Did the opening grab you? Would its argument be more powerful as a dialogue? What other prompts could we use to tighten it up?

The possibilities are enormous but yes, ChatGPT does also open up new temptations for kids to shirk the work they are supposed to be doing on their own. That means that we, as parents, are going to have to remind and reinforce to our kids a few important points:

1) God loves a hard-won C. Or to put it another way, God doesn't care about your marks: if you get a low grade but tried hard, great, but He hates an ill-gotten A. And your parents think the very same.

2) Cheating hurts you (Prov. 10:2). A basketball player might be able to build a robot that shoots better than he does, but it isn't going to help him learn how to shoot. If an assignment is intended to help a student learn to write, getting someone or something to write it cheats the student out of what they could have learned. Cheating is also a matter of character – if you'll cheat on something as little as an essay, what kind of person are you becoming? You do become what you do.

3) Knowing how to write remains an important skill even in the era of AI, because of all the skills a student has to learn to be able to do it, like: research, organizing thoughts, and learning to discern truth from error and stronger points from weaker ones. That'll help you write an essay, but also choose a career, and even assess who you might want to marry.

That's a bit of the tech talk Ed Com has been chatting about for a while now, and having some fun with it. We also continue with the Science curriculum review, which is part of a 7-8 year cycle in which we look at the whole of the curriculum. And in a bit of "save the date" news, we've got Carl Nienhuis booked for a Parent Information Evening on April 24 on the topic of playing basketball (and other sports too) to the glory of God.

~ From the Principal ~

"I will lift up my eyes to the mountains; From where shall my help come? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth." Psalm 121:1,2

The truth of these words is always near our hearts, but never more so than when life is hard. When our grief overwhelms, when days are dark, it is only in our LORD God that we can find our help. "The LORD is our keeper (vs 5a);" "The LORD will guard your going out and your coming in (vs 8a)". Because of the promises of our faithful God and Father are we able to go on from day to day.

Covenantal education. What a treasure! But do we indeed treasure it? When we speak about the fact that we are in a covenant with God the Father, do we think about it as a relationship? We get to be in a relationship with God! In fact, he calls us his children, so that makes us royalty. Teachers at Cornerstone Christian school are privileged to instruct royal children! What a calling! Sometimes we talk about education as a preparation for life, but life is now. All of us have a responsibility to learn, including our children. These thoughts were gleaned from a presentation given by Mark den Hollander at a recent PD day. We hope to hear more at our upcoming PD day in March. While hearing about covenantal education is not new, it is always good to take time to be encouraged and reminded again about the importance and special nature of our task in raising children in the fear of the LORD.

As we have completed our work day to day, the students have progressed through their studies. In high school, the second quarter is complete, and in elementary, we are deep into our second trimester. For teachers this is a rewarding time of year. The students are very immersed in their school work, with regular week following regular week, with a lot of continuity. Especially in the younger grades, tangible strides can be made at this time of year, as the foundational learning during

the first trimester solidifies and blossoms. Simply put, it's encouraging to see progress!

On the other side of things students can also be found lacking in attentiveness and drive sometimes. The incentive to participate in sports is a proverbial 'stick behind the door', but it becomes discouraging when students clearly do not put in the necessary effort into their school work. Extra credit is available, but is meant for students who have already demonstrated their desire to do well on the regular work, but failed to reach the desired grade. Extra credit should not be seen as an alternative assignment choice.

As a little side note, I want to point out that teachers strive purposefully to avoid homework or studying that needs to take place on the weekend, specifically Sunday. It is realized, of course, that it is not our place to speak into your homes and how you spend your Sunday, but I am asking you to avoid Sunday communications with the teachers.

Review of recent events

Upon our return to school in January, our first week included an assembly with Prof. T. VanRaalte of the Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary. It's not easy for someone to come and speak engagingly to such a broad spectrum of ages. He certainly did well. Encouraging our students to think about attendance at the seminary, whether with ministry as a goal, or otherwise, was one point he made. In addition, he wanted to make sure the students were aware of the seminary's existence, its importance, and the work that they are engaged in. However, he also spoke to all of us about our school theme. "Walking in the Spirit" or "living in the Spirit", and this is where he was able to reach everyone at every age. He reminded us of what that means, and it was a good encouragement to keep on striving to do exactly that!

At the beginning of February, we had our monthly school gathering, but this time we met in the gym for a more formal assembly. At this assembly we were joined by Rev. Jon Chase at his home in Brazil. He was able to share with us some information and pictures about the Mission work that is done there. We chose to support the work of Mission in Brazil, with a specific focus on a struggling church in Brasilia. With our various types of fundraisers during the month, we hope to raise \$4000 to share with our brothers and sisters in Brazil.

Since our December issue of the Link, the high school students also completed their second quarter. This meant parent-teacher conferences. It never ceases to be an encouragement to the teachers to meet with the various parents and connect formally about the students' progress. We are thankful for your support and time.

Looking ahead

The big event that the school is busy preparing for currently is our Fine Arts Evening. A presentation of musical gifts will start the evening, with static displays set up in the various classrooms. The preparation for the event is a long process, with art samples being collected from the first weeks of school already, and lots of practice time being given to the musical presentations. We are very excited to share the results with all of you, and celebrate the talents and skills the students are developing in this sphere. See the information notice elsewhere.

In a few weeks, the elementary school will send out the reports on students' progress. At the parent-teacher conferences following the reports, teachers will also be able to share the results of the fall and winter Aimsweb testing. These test results are more meaningful when more than one testing session has been completed. It allows us to see growth or a lack of progress. What is also beneficial is the ability to delve into the test results and pinpoint specific areas that need intervention, or re-instruction. That can be true for a single individual, a small group or the whole class. Teachers do take the time to evaluate the results, looking for ways to make the instruction specifically targeted to the needs of the students.

In the spring, but still before the next issue of the LINK, we hope to host our annual Grandparents' Day, on April 18th. Be assured that any who might fit that category age wise, are heartily welcomed as honorary visitors. We love it when you take the time to join us on this special day. There's enough soup for everyone!

And so we continue with our work. "Our help comes from the LORD!" We are blessed with a relationship with our God. He loves us and cares for us, and because of that we are able to do our work. May we continue to do so with joy and faithfulness, to God's glory.

With great thankfulness, the faculty and staff at CCRTC can look forward to the beginning of a new year and reflect on the many blessings the College has enjoyed.


