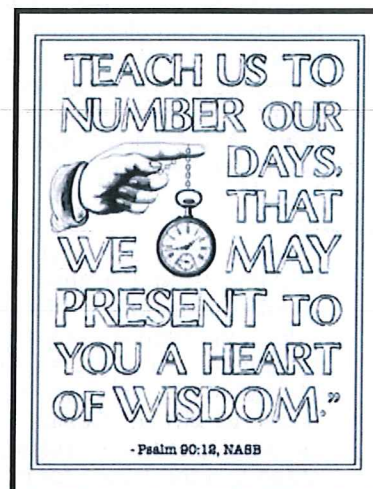

We will shortly publish an amendment to this resolution as it was pointed out by one of our members that there are specific rules under which the Capital Project Fund was established. Due to these rules the board will propose instead that the Funds for the special resolution come from Operating savings account. More details on this will follow...

The board has worked together (with input from the membership) to come up with a proposed budget for the next school year. The budget meetings are always painstaking as it takes much consideration in trying to do the best for our school and its members. There are many things to account for when this is put together. As a board we are very thankful for our

capable Treasurer and the work that he does!

The Endowment Starter Fund Board continues its fine work and will have an update on various items at the membership meeting. We are thankful for all their work and the forward thinking that is happening to try to make Christian education more affordable for future generations. As a board we encourage all our members to support this organization.

On behalf of the board, I would like to thank all those who have come out to volunteer and help with the school spring clean-up. The grounds look great! Thank you for all who have helped with this yearly maintenance and a special shout out goes to the CBM for arranging the clean up!

should be ready to install in a couple of short weeks. Many thanks to Tim Faber who has helped with this project!

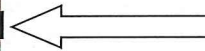

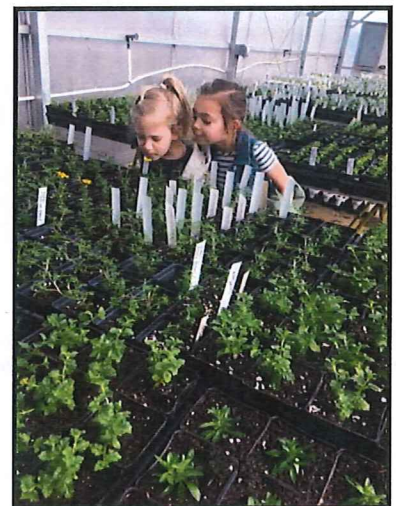

Community

Teaching in a Reformed School

Last year The League of Canadian Reformed Schools in Ontario conducted a survey across five of their high

schools. Their juniors and seniors were invited to fill out the survey and some 230 students responded. Broadly, they were asked to indicate the important factors in their career choice, their considerations for a career in a Reformed School, factors in considering the teaching profession and their recommendations for attracting teachers. There were a few interesting takeaways from this report that are worth sharing:

There is a general *lack of awareness* of a teacher's work and the rewards of being a teacher. Further, and more strikingly, while there is a systemic challenge of a shortage of Reformed teachers there is apparently a good percentage of our communities that are unaware of this shortage.

Teachers might not always be as deliberate as they could be in being positive ambassadors of the teaching profession.

Career counsellors in high schools could be more deliberate in raising the profile of the teaching profession.

Certainly some food for thought and an opportunity for some introspection. Do we do enough with our young people to promote teaching as a career? What are some ways we can be more deliberate about that? What inspiration is provided in our living rooms for the teaching profession? Is teaching being encouraged as a respectable calling, a noble task, and a necessity for the instruction and well-being of our Christian communities into the future?

Student Academic Support Services

I am delighted with the research and report writing that was done by some of the members of the Education Committee in this area. I am glad too, that the board adopted the recommendations put forward by the committee so that we can begin to provide a little more specialized help for those that need it and to seek out appropriate resources for those needs. You will hear more details at our upcoming Membership Meeting, but suffice to say, the CCS teachers and support staff are excited about the opportunities afforded by these developments. Congratulations to all involved!

Upgrades and Maintenance

The spring clean-up crew did a nice job of sprucing up the school grounds! Thank-you to all those who lent a hand. The CBM continue to support the teachers by ensuring the maintenance tasks are completed in a timely fashion. Another group of individuals who are really on top of their game is the IT committee.
