

Thanks to all who came to the Spring Membership Meeting. We are grateful that the operating budget could be approved, as well as the Special Resolution for the fence purchase. We are thankful to the Lord for his continued provision and that we can be in a position to show only modest tuition increases while also reducing our pledge drive by approximately \$20,000 compared to the prior year.

The Board is following up with membership seeking commitments for the 2019-2020 Operating Pledge drive. Thank you to all the commitments received from membership thus far. If you haven't yet responded back to the Board, we kindly ask that you get in touch with a Board member as soon as possible so that we can complete the drive. We are on our way to meeting the goal, but we still require some further commitments.

You should have received a letter and statement in your church mailbox noting this past fiscal year's monthly charges and payments in your account for tuition, dues and pledges. Please let myself or the bookkeeper know of any discrepancies.

As a reminder, here are the 2019/2020 fiscal year tuition and dues rates effective August 1.

- \$160 for members without children in the school, or
- \$475 for students in grades 1-2, or
- \$600 for students in grades 3-4, or
- \$830 for students in grades 5-8, or
- \$990 for students in grades 9-12

The Keystone Project Committee has passed along an update to relay, as well as a refresher regarding their purpose and intentions. Here is their update:

The Keystone Project is a private LLC initiated in 2016 to build and sell spec homes with the profits being donated to Cornerstone Christian School. Funding for this project has been obtained through private lenders. This funding, along with volunteer help from the school community, has allowed us to build and sell four homes in the past four years. We hope to have our fifth house completed by the end of July. This house officially went on the market last week. A new lot has been secured for House #6 and we anticipate a fall start on this next project. So far, we have been able to donate \$90K to the school budget. The Lord has blessed us in so many ways with this project and we continue to look for his guidance and direction as we move forward. We are constantly reevaluating this project and its effectiveness. As long as the market remains strong, we have the backing from our lenders, a strong Keystone committee and great volunteer help from the community, we will continue to build spec homes and donate to the school. We appreciate vour support.

CCS Senior Project Rationale - Why a senior project?

The mission statement of Cornerstone Christian School reads, "To assist parents in educating the children of the covenant as part of their preparation for a Christ-centered service and stewardship in the kingdom and church of God." The Senior Project serves as a culminating project for which our students will receive opportunity to give full expression to the preparation they have received through twelve years of Reformed Education.

Additionally, Cornerstone has adopted a set of Core Competencies (or skills) that students will explore, learn and apply throughout their years at CCS.

This project will stretch a student in the areas of personal responsibility, communication, and creative & critical thinking. Students will demonstrate the ability to work with other people, explore and develop their talents, and apply an understanding of how their Christian Worldview applies to their work.

In more plain-spoken terms, the Senior Project is an opportunity for students to take on ambitious tasks that they might not otherwise think to do – tasks that will make them uncomfortable at times, have them wrestling with frustration, dealing with deadlines, and propel them to learn new skills. Tasks that will stretch them in ways they may not yet have been stretched in their schooling career, but ways in which they can expect to be stretched once they leave our halls. It is a chance for them to take up this big, real world type-of-challenge, but to still do so while operating within the safety net of school, parents, and mentors.

In sum, the senior project endeavors to give students a hands-on, service opportunity through which they are encouraged to demonstrate their learning and work habits in a real-life, tangible way.

Senior Project Overarching Goals

The senior project will give students the opportunity to: 1. Develop their talents, pursue special interests, or explore career interests in a hands-on way.

2. Stretch themselves in the areas of communication, personal responsibility and creative & critical thinking.

3. Work and communicate with others, including mentors, in the wider community.

4. Serve others, either in the project itself, or through the skills and experience gained.

5. Specifically apply a Christian worldview to their participation in and presentation of their project of choice.
