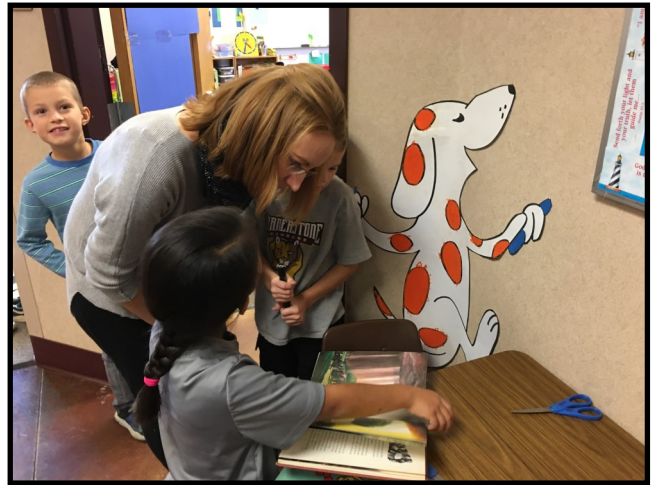

## ~ Principal Report ~

Why do you send your children to Cornerstone Christian School? I think most would agree that we have a caring, Christian culture and community, a solid academic program, a team of dedicated teachers and a raft of faithful volunteers. Truly, Cornerstone is a blessing to our children, our families and the broader community. It's a gift from God that we do well to treasure and give thanks for.

At the same time, why Cornerstone? It's possible that community expectations, tradition, cost etc. can be 'drivers' weighing into our decision to send our children to CCS. But let's consider for a moment what your chief desire is for your children as they grow up? What do you want for them above anything else? In other words, what vision do you have for your children? And what do you do to immerse your children in this 'vision for life'?

### Christian Worldview

Albert Mohler, in his book The Conviction to Lead makes the observation that years ago, economist Thomas Sowell, when observing why the same people tended to end up on opposing sides of controversies, came to this basic conclusion: People do not think issue by issue and question by question. Instead, they operate out of what he called a vision - a basic understanding of reality. In Sowell's words, visions are "the silent shapers of our thoughts". As parents and teachers, we understand that these visions shape our thoughts without most people even being aware that it is happening. We're building a mindset day by day, bit by bit. (Mohler, 43)

At Cornerstone, I think it's fair to say that we are in the 'business' of shaping these "silent shapers". We are helping our students develop a unified understanding of the world through each subject they study. They are gathering a set of ideas that makes their world make sense and allows them to see their place in it. For example, those that believe that their greatest reward must be found in this life will shape their worldview accordingly, and that belief will drive many other beliefs and assumptions. The same pattern works for us. We form a worldview and then the worldview forms us. (Mohler, 43)

Mohler articulates the Christian worldview as *a robust and rich model of Christian thinking - the quality of thinking that culminates in a God-centered worldview, which requires that we see all truth as interconnected. Ultimately, the wholeness of truth can be traced to the fact that God is himself the author of all truth.*

And he goes on to say, *Christianity's doctrines are not like separate tools in a mechanics belt to be used only when needed. Instead, Christianity is a comprehensive worldview and way of life that grows out of Christian reflection of the Bible and the unfolding plan of God revealed in the unity of the scriptures.* This focus gives parents and teachers a high calling

and an exciting challenge. We have the opportunity to teach our children to think Christianly through all the subjects we teach. More, we need to instruct and help our children approach every question in life in the light of God's truth. Those of us that are raising teenagers know that God's truth is not always the go-to plumb line. Often peers, social media celebrities, musicians, sports 'stars', movie motifs and the like are forming attitudes and a way-of-thinking in our children that clearly collides with the Christian worldview. How do we push against this tide? How do we help our children see that what the world has to offer does not have lasting value? By showing them that the "way of the Truth and the Life" (Jesus Christ) is much superior and far more beautiful than any other worldview. In partnership with parents, Cornerstone needs to help our students uncover and see the truth and be able to articulate why the truth does not line up with the "spirits of this age".

As Mohler says: *a God-centered worldview brings every issue, question, and cultural concern into submission to all that the Bible reveals, and frames all understanding within the ultimate purpose of bringing greater glory to God. This task of bringing every thought captive to Christ requires more than haphazard Christian thinking.... The recovery of the Christian mind and the development of a comprehensive Christian worldview will require the deepest theological reflection, the most consecrated application of scholarship, the most sensitive commitment to compassion, and the courage to face all questions without fear.*

Sound daunting? I don't think it has to be nor should it be. When we became parents, when we said "I do" at the baptism of our children, we committed to instructing them in the ways of the Lord. A few quick thoughts to think upon:

- Developing a Christian worldview does not happen with a few conversations when an "issue" comes up. It needs to be imbedded throughout our curriculum and flow out of our teaching. Our kids need to hear it around our dinner tables, in



- A Christian mindset does not rely on tradition or "this is just the way our family does it" mentality. We need to take the time to explain the decisions we make and why we do the things we do, in the light of God's norms.
- Use the opportunity early on to explain the value of Reformed Christian education to your children. As in: "This is a wonderful opportunity to develop a Christian mind and worldview. Soak it in, take it seriously, do your best, it's a gift of a lifetime". Impress on your chil-

dren that school is not just a time to pass the time. No matter your ability, it's training for life.

I am very thankful that the teachers at Cornerstone are eager to bring God's truths to bare in all the subjects they teach. We'll continue to challenge them to think Christianly, to act circumspectly and to take hold of the truths of the Bible. Let's work in partnership together to shape their vision so that our children "may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work (1 Timothy 3:17).

In the past year the Endowment Fund received some more donations and the balance has grown to \$106,782.15. We as Endowment Board have invested \$100K in a Money Market Fund at Peoples Bank and have earned \$1,082 in interest to date this year. We are open to ideas from the membership on an investment proposal or strategy to present to the membership (in the future).

One activity we have been busy with behind the scenes this past year is how to more effectively market the en-

dowment fund and grow our principal investment balance. We are looking for ways to keep this estate bequest target well known to the membership and provide some estate planning aids and information on local professionals that can help draft a will. We are also planning to roll out a new website, to refresh our single page of simple information on the school website. In conjunction with the website we hope to create a 1 page flashy brochure that can be given to grandparents & family and also be available to all the local community folks, ones that frequent our gym on a regular basis during all the sporting events. A Marketing Committee has been initiated for all this good work and we will be asking some society members to join this committee, those who would love to see their marketing skills be put to good use - be given the opportunity to do so.

This past year our Canadian foundation or society Foundation for Reformed Education (FFRE) has been ready, able and willing to receive donations from your Canadian family and friends. Talk to your Canadian family about this and if they are interested in supporting Cornerstone, they can write a check to FFRE and receive a CDN tax receipt. The Endowment Board Treasurer, Clarence Kobes or the School Treasurer can receive these gifts and can forward the gift to FFRE and ensure a Canadian Tax Receipt is provided.

Last year at this time we approached the membership with an official Fund Drive to get our fund balance to \$100k by the end of last year, and we did get to that milestone! Thank you again to all the generous donors. While we are not actively engaging in a phone call Fund Drive this year end, we would still graciously accept donations. Please consider the Endowment Fund in your year end giving if you have been so blessed to be able to consider some extra giving over and above what you have already pledged to your school and other important charities.
